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PUPIL PREMIUM 2015 2016

The Pupil Premium is allocated to children who are known to be eligible for Traditional Free School Meals (FSM), service children, adopted children and children who have been looked after continuously for more than six months. This also includes pupils eligible for FSM at any point in the last six years (known as the Ever 6 measure).

Schools can decide how the Pupil Premium is spent, since they are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for the individual pupils at their school.

At Uley C. of E. Primary School we support <u>all</u> our pupils. This is mainly done by providing quality teaching, supplemented by interventions and teaching assistant support to meet the children's needs to ensure they make good progress. The school is asked to identify this special fund allocation and monitor the impact of this Pupil Premium.
