Enrichment Groups

Last year we set up enrichment groups for children and we are very fortunate to have Mrs Pugh to run these weekly sessions which will continue again this year. As the year progressed, we made some tweaks including the size of the groups and we have created a simple baseline to support us in identifying areas for focus and monitoring any impact.

We aim to start our enrichment groups on Thursday 3rd October. Mrs Pugh and Mrs Mandeville (SENDco) work with the class staff, to recognise children who may benefit from some time during an afternoon, once a week, out of the classroom, to engage in activities that support the children to meet the social and intellectual demands of school life, improving their self-confidence and self-esteem.


The aims of our enrichment group are:

- To develop children's self- esteem
- To develop children's social skills
- To provide a calm environment
- To build relationships between adults and children
- To help the children grow in confidence, trust and reliability
- To provide a secure environment where children learn
- To provide the children with nurturing care from caring adults
- To help children learn the consequences of certain behaviours
- To work in partnership with parents and school staff to ensure consistent approach

This, of course, will be working in conjunction with you, as parents. Parents will be fully involved along the way. If we think a child would benefit from engaging in these valuable sessions then we will be in touch via email in the first instance, or if you think your child would benefit from these sessions, please come and speak to us.

Snacks

The infants receive a piece of fruit or vegetable daily through the government run, Fruit and Vegetable Scheme and we would encourage juniors to bring in a piece for break times also; it can be a long morning without a snack! Friday's are Fruitless Fridays when children can bring in a fruitless snack for break time. Water is available throughout the day.



Toast is available every Tuesday for the Infants and every Thursday for the Juniors, 10p a slice.

Children's Questionnaire Results and Feedback 2018 - 2019

Back in the summer term we asked the children for their views and have had some pleasing results.

95% children say they like school (2019) YR - Y5

100% infant children strongly agree or agree they feel safe in school (2019)

93% junior children strongly agree or agree they feel safe in school (2019)

100% Y6 children strongly agree or agree that they have been encouraged to achieve and exceed targets 98% children strongly agree or agree they are making good progress YR – Y5

98% infant children strongly agree or agree that teachers tell them how well they are doing 91% junior children strongly agree or agree that teachers tell them how well they are progressing Y3-5

100% infant children strongly agree or agree they can talk to an adult of they need help 83% junior children strongly agree or agree they can talk to an adult of they need help Y3-5

100% infant children strongly agree or agree are expected to be the best they can be 98% juniors children strongly agree or agree are expected to work hard and be the best they can be Y3-5

91% of all children YR – Y5 strongly agree or agree they enjoy borrowing books from the library Reasons from children disagreeing – worry about getting book back on time, forgetting books, losing books, don't get time to finish book

Parent Questionnaire Results and Feedback 2018 - 2019

Firstly I would like to thank everyone who took the time to complete the Parents' Questionnaire in the summer term. We had 18 questionnaires returned (21% of the Uley families) and it was pleasing to see the positive results. Uley School is not complacent which means we are always looking at ways make our school even better.

The staff have discussed your feedback and I would like to share some of the top results and questions that received the lowest results.

100% agree/strongly agree the school has a happy atmosphere.

100% agree/strongly agree I am made to feel welcome when I come into school

100% agree/strongly agree my child is happy at school

100% agree/strongly agree the school helps to develop skills in mathematics

97% agree/strongly agree the school helps to develop skills in communication, reading and writing.

94% agree/strongly agree the school ensures my child is well looked after.

94% agree/strongly agree my child feels safe at school.

89% agree/strongly agree the school meets my child's needs.

89% agree/strongly agree there is a good standard of behaviour at school.

84% agree/strongly agree the school responds well to my concerns

83% agree/strongly agree my child is making good progress at school.

45% agree/strongly agree the school deals with case of bullying effectively and 50% responded don't know

78% agree/ strongly agree the school helps me to support my child's learning.

At Uley School we value parental input.

During parent evenings, teachers will update you on where your child is in terms of attainment via a National Curriculum target sheet which identifies areas to focus on over the coming weeks. Teachers will talk you through how you can support at home.

We have organised information sessions in the past such as phonics, e-safety etc. but unfortunately these have not always been well attended. We will continue to plan for information sessions and look forward to better attendance.

We encourage parents to come and speak to us if there is an area of the curriculum you feel you would like bit more information about in order to support your child's learning.

50% agree/ strongly agree my child gets the right amount of homework

Homework is not compulsory and for some that is great news. There is always debate about giving homework, what homework looks like and how much. We take into account that homework is an expectation at secondary school and we would not be giving our children the best chances if we didn't support good habits from an early age.

Our Homework Policy aims to strike a happy balance.

The school's topic web provides a variety of curriculum linked tasks which support the current topic over a term. For short term homework there is Rainbow Maths and Mathletics which can be practised to support the children's mathematical skills. With the introduction of the Multiplication Test for Year 4s in 2020, learning timetables from any age is important. In the infants, this can start with counting in twos, fives and tens

At Uley School we believe in reading for enjoyment and that learning to read is essential in order to access other learning and therefore encourage daily reading at home. This can be the school's reading book, a picture book, comic, or hearing an adult read.

Phonic and spelling practise is sent home to support the stage each child is working at.

78% agree/ strongly agree the school keeps me well informed. At Uley School there is a variety of ways to keep informed.

- Newsletters are sent out approximately every other week and is full of information about what is happening in the school, updates and dates. A copy of the newsletter is:

- Uley School has a Facebook Page where notes and reminders are added
- O The school website contains a lot of school information including a calendar of events. Any correspondence sent out is added. You will find notes and reminders on the home page. There is also a link to our Facebook page from the website.
- Other correspondence that requires a response will be sent out via hard copies or email
- O Hard copies of correspondence will be sent home via pupils, so please check with them and check book bags.
- A few copies of each letter sent home can be found in the letter rack next to the front door.

Please inform us of changes in contact details as soon as possible or if you are not receiving emails. Unexplained things can happen to emails at times!

Don't forget that staff are happy to arrange to talk to you, should you:

- like an update on your child's progress other than Parent's Evenings
- like more information on how to support your child at home
- like to celebrate your child's achievements in and out of school
- have a worry
- have any questions about your child's education
- need clarification/reminders on information

61% agree/ strongly agree the school library had made a positive impact on my child's reading Reading of any kind is really important for children; this includes magazines, non-fiction books etc. Children bring home book banded books which the children are expected to read confidently at home. The library offers alternative to the classroom reading books and promotes reading for enjoyment. A library timetable will be collected again for the next academic year. It would be great to see this percentage rise. Look out for the library lending dates 2019-2020.

Has the offering of after school clubs and sporting activities been reduced?	The school has just received the bronze award for participation in school competitions and we were one off receiving a silver award. The school is currently working towards the healthy school status which requires being active hence the introduction of Active 10 as well as focussing on good mental health.		
There is not enough focus on PE and school sport	The school has a sports coach who delivers an active club, curriculum sessions linked to mental health and Balanceability for the young children. We participate in the local small schools events (as a cluster at at school) which are in addition to the day to day PE curriculum. The school has entered many events over the past year including girl's and boy's football, netball, hockey, field event, dance, cross country, tag rugby. School staff and parents volunteer their time to run school clubs and pupil voice is taken into account.		
	PE money is used to invest in upskilling staff for example recent gym training and working alongside coaches. Please take a look at our PE report which can be found on line. This report will give you information regarding sport provision.		
Ongoing gender imbalance in the teaching staff	Recruitment at Uley for which ever post, is open to all. The process is inclusive, fair and non-discriminatory. When recruiting a teacher (and other roles in the school), we look for is a quality teacher who has excellent references which demonstrate a good track record, has high expectations of learning and behaviour, someone who is safe, approachable, kind and caring, and who is committed to ensuring every child flourishes. Here are some statistics taken from the School Workforce Census England: November 2018: 74% of full time equivalent teachers in primary and secondary education are female There are 140,074 qualified female teachers employed in local authority maintained schools compared to 22,514 male teachers There are 173,503 female teaching assistants in local authority maintained schools compared to 7,819 male teaching assistants In Gloucestershire there are 26.8% qualified male teachers and 6.8% male teaching assistants. From experience, applications from male teachers are few and far between although 17% of Uley School workforce is male - IT technician, sports coach, teaching assistant and cleaner/caretaker
