Our Uley School Governors are very proactive and like to get involved in school life which is hugely appreciated. Please find some reports of recent visits.

#### **Mark Easy visited Maths**

A very enlightening visit to the school in my governor capacity to observe the application of the mathematics curriculum.

I managed to visit all four classes and had the pleasure of witnessing the live interaction between the teaching staff and the children during the lesson. I also had the opportunity to engage with individual children and see how they approached tasks and applied learning. This was supplemented with a group session to discuss Uley's approach to maths, how they seek help should they find something too difficult and how the 99 club encourages competition and self-challenge.

As a governor (and a parent) leading up to this visit, my intention was to focus on the application of the required curriculum and importantly how the school manages this across our mixed-year group classes. I can report that there is consistency of application across and within the four classes, linking each learning objective at the right level and directly building on the prior learnings.

The children appeared fully engaged and active within the teaching environment and the staff are wonderfully supportive.

#### Attendance Matters

We will now be sending out your child's school attendance information after the Easter break. this is for you to see data across the autumn and spring terms. But what does the attendance data mean?

Children attend school for 52% of the year. This means 48% of the year, the children are not in school. This includes weekends.

Equates to 10 days off school each year	95%	Slight Concern
Equates to 20 days off school each year	90%	Concerned
Equates to 30 days off school each year	85%	Very Concerned

An attendance of 95% means that a child is missing 10 days off per year. Based on 6 lessons per day, this equates to 60 missed lessons.

An attendance of 90% means that a child is missing 20 days off per year, this equates to 120 missed lessons.

An attendance of 85% means that a child is missing 30 days off per year, this equates to 180 missed lessons.

In order for our children to be given the chance to be the best they can be and to flourish as much as they possibly can, we believe that punctuality and attendance is important. This means avoiding time out of school during term time for trips out or holidays, avoiding routine medical appointments (where possible) or attending school before an appointment or returning after an appointment. It is within our policy to request information regarding appointments and also to decide whether an absence is authorised or unauthorised depending on the information given.

#### Whole school attendance from September 2024 until Monday 7<sup>th</sup> April – 96.4%

Please support us in achieving our goal of good attendance by ensuring the children attend school regularly and on time. We do understand there are times when children are unable to attend school such as illness, or are late, due to unforeseen traffic circumstances.

If you have any questions or queries regarding attendance, please arrange to come and speak to us.

#### **Parent Consultation**

As of yet, we have not received many responses. We appreciate your views at Uley Primary School and therefore are recirculating the parent consultation. Please take some time to respond. If you would like us to print a copy for you, then please ask.

We would like to take this opportunity to remind families that we always encourage parents to come and speak to us should you:

#### Reception


