In summary, having weathered the many challenges of the recent years, we will now be prioritising our curriculum rolling programmes. These will be prioritised and rolled out over the next few months as well as focusing on our phonics programme.

## **Staffing**

I am pleased to announce that Miss Hannah Morris will be joining us in September as Class 4 teacher. Miss Morris has 12 years' experience working with upper juniors and has been teaching in a school in Bristol for the last 8 years. She is looking forward to joining the team at Uley and we are excited about her joining us. She will be visiting for transition sessions though the term and we will organise a time in the Autumn for you all to come and meet her. In the meantime, please come and say hello when you see her in the playground.

We continue to recruit for before and after school club reserve staff, a midday supervisor and a teacher to cover PPA and to teach in Class 1 one day a week.

**Parent Questionnaire  
Feedback Spring 2022**

Firstly I would like to thank everyone who took the time to complete the Parents' Questionnaire in the spring term. We had 15% of questionnaires returned and 15% of the children represented. It is pleasing to see the positive results. Uley School is not complacent which means we are always looking at ways to make our school even better.

Coronavirus seems to have had an impact on some questions. Hopefully, now that we are returning to a typical Uley School, the next time we send out the questionnaire, these responses will be different.

The staff have discussed your feedback and I would like to share some of the top and lowest results.

- 100% agree/strongly agree I am made to feel welcome when I come to school.
- 100% agree/strongly agree the school ensures my child is well looked after.
- 100% agree/strongly agree my child feels safe at school.
- 100% agree/strongly agree I feel able to speak to school staff.
- 100% agree/strongly agree this school helps my child to develop skills in communication, reading and writing.
- 100% would recommend Uley School to other parents.
- 94% agreed/strongly agreed the school has a happy atmosphere. 6% didn't know.
- 94% agree/strongly agree the school helps to develop skills in mathematics. 6% didn't know.
- 83% agree/strongly agree there is a good standard of behaviour at school. 18% didn't know

Back in the early days of the pandemic, can you remember the management of Cornoavirus in schools said that we had to prevent anything from being brought in to school due to spreading the virus? No bags, no pencil cases, no books, we had to remove soft furnishings and items had to be quarantined!</p>
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	<p>We are returning to our usual homework shares (the next one being <b>Monday 27<sup>th</sup> June at 2.45pm</b> so no more sending in photos via emails – hurray!</p> <p>Through the questionnaires, we are hearing that there are requests for supporting children’s learning at home – Phonics, Maths, Purple Mash.</p> <p>We have taken these on board and will be considering this in the not too distant future as we review our curriculum. Do come and ask us any questions in the meantime.</p> <p>We are currently reviewing our phonics scheme and will be offering some phonics sessions for parents once the scheme has been implemented (Autumn 22). In the meantime we can answer any questions or offer some guidance, just come and ask and we’ll give you a 1-1 session alongside your child.</p>
<p>88% agree/strongly agree my child is making good progress at school.</p> <p>12% didn’t know.</p>	<p>Again, Coronavirus has had a huge impact on how we manage teacher/parent meetings to discuss your child’s progress. The video consultations have been a great resource (when IT is reliable) although the downsides are that the children’s books are missing and it does not replace the personal face to face contact and the relationship building within the school community.</p> <p>I am sure the video consultations will have their place especially for parents who need to work late and for whom it is more convenient, and we will consider that. The aim going forward is to return to face to face meetings maybe with the addition of video options if necessary.</p> <p>The teacher/parent meetings happen in the autumn and spring terms but this does not mean that you have to wait until then for an update on your child’s progress or support with any aspects of education. If you have any questions about anything, no matter how big or small, or would like to know more about your child’s progress and how you can best support at home, I cannot stress enough the importance of making an appointment to speak with the class teachers and school staff.</p> <p>The pandemic has had a huge impact on the emailing system at school and we now receive an unprecedented amount of emails daily. We have a Communication Policy which gives timelines as to when you can expect responses but where there are questions or worries, we recommend that emails are avoided as we will be able to answer your questions sooner. Come and speak to us – it is so much better now that we can!</p>
<p>59% agree/strongly agrees the school deals with any cases of bullying effectively. (Bullying includes persistent name-</p>	<p>We are always promoting kindness and celebrating difference and diversity. We are also promoting the definition of bullying, keeping children safe online and the impact that being unkind online can have.</p> <p>Any online activity that can occur outside of school time that is brought to our attention is dealt with swiftly and we ask parents to be vigilant</p>

calling, cyber, racist and homophobic bullying). 51% didn't know	about their children's activity online and encourage conversations about online use at home.  51% not knowing hopefully means that it hasn't had to be dealt with because it isn't there.
	<b>Just so you know:</b> In Class 1 we use a tool called Tapestry to share photos of what is going on in the classroom. We are currently setting up SeeSaw, which is similar to Tapestry and will extend to the whole school. Once it is set up, school staff will be able to take a photo (e.g. our visit to the Jubilee playground) with the school iPad, post it on SeeSaw and tag the relevant parents/classes in it to share the photo. We are just in the process of making sure we cover all aspects of GDPR, then we will need staff training and will roll it out to families. We aim to do this in readiness for the autumn term.

### Ofsted Parent View

The outcomes of the Parent View can be viewed at [Ofsted Parent View](#). The results were discussed as part of the inspection process. Thank you again for the positive comments. We are really pleased that the children are happy and feel safe, that children are well-behaved and that any bullying is dealt with quickly and effectively. We would be interested in exploring the reasons to the statements that received the lower responses.

When I have raised concerns with the school they have been dealt with properly.  13% disagree	If the concern is about any aspect of your child, the first step is to speak to the class teacher. If it is not resolved then the next step would be to meet again with the class teacher and myself.  There is a Compliments and Complaints Policy with procedures to follow and a Communication Policy which sets out timelines and different ways to communicate.  We do not wish for anyone to feel that their concern has not been dealt with, and would encourage communication at any level to avoid this, as this does not reflect our school values (Friendship, Trust, Compassion and Wisdom) and is not the ethos we wish for our school.
The school has high expectations for my child.  31% disagree	We strive for every child to be the best they can be and to flourish in all aspects of school life.  We are here to talk about where parents feel we have not met those expectations.
My child does well at this school.  19% don't know	We have set times for teacher parent meetings but that does not mean you cannot have updates at any other time throughout the year. Come and speak to us and we will gladly make time to discuss your child and aspects of school.  Some staff are outside in the morning and all staff are outside at the end of the day.
The school lets me know how my child is doing.  6% disagree	
There is a good range of subjects available to my child at this school.	We teach all 13 subjects of the National Curriculum which include RE and PSHE.

<p>25% disagree / 19% don't know</p>	<p>With 13 subjects to manage, we are on a cycle of curriculum development which started in autumn 2019 when the Ofsted framework changed and schools were required to review their curriculums as identified in the school development plan, a summary of which can be found on the school website. Again, Coronavirus has made this challenging through the Spring/Summer 20 and again in Spring 21 but we have not stopped working towards our school development targets.</p> <p>Each term we send out class letters informing parents of the topics and the subjects taught that term. Long term overviews can also be found on the school website.</p>
<p>My child can take part in clubs and activities at this school.</p> <p>31% disagree</p>	<p>Unfortunately Coronavirus has not helped, but clubs are back!</p>
<p>I would recommend this school to another parent.</p> <p>19% would not recommend Uley to another parent</p>	<p>Obviously we would like 100% for this question and would like to explore why this could be. We are happy to discuss this in person.</p>

### Children's Questionnaire Results Spring 2022

Back in the Spring term we asked the children for their views and have had some pleasing results.

95% strongly agree or agree if I am bullied in school I am not afraid to tell someone

95% strongly agree or agree in school we have agreed what we mean by bullying and what to do if we feel we are being bullied

95% strongly agree or agree the pupils in our school are taught to value one another

94% strongly agree or agree that they feel safe in school

### Ways of Getting Information

There is a variety of ways to find school information.

- Other correspondence that requires a response will be sent out via hard copies or email
- Hard copies of some correspondence will be sent home via pupils, so please check frequently with them and check book bags.

Any questions about the information sent out or if you think you may have missed some information, please do not hesitate to come and speak to a member of staff. Please also let the school know if you have changed your phone number or email address.

- have a worry
- have any questions about your child's education
- need clarification/reminders on information
